I. Chair Lefkovitz called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. via Zoom/teleconference call in Sacramento, California. Board members present were Joanne Ahola, Al Brown, Heather Davis, Harold Fong, Paul Keefer, Bina Lefkovitz, and Karina Talamantes. Also present were David W. Gordon, Superintendent and Secretary to the Board; Nancy Herota, Deputy Superintendent; Teresa Stinson, General Counsel, Jerry Jones, Executive Director of Technology; other staff and visitors; and Shannon Hansen, Executive Assistant.

II. Chris Clark, Folsom Cordova Unified School District Board President, led the Pledge of Allegiance.

V.A. Tim Herrera read a public comment from Scott Rafferty regarding the San Juan Unified School District.

VI.A. Chair Lefkovitz announced that the Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization (County Committee) will hold a public hearing on the Folsom Cordova Unified School District (FCUSD) proposal to adopt an alternative method of electing governing board members. Currently, FCUSD governing board members are elected by the registered voters of the entire school district (“at-large elections”). FCUSD proposed to change its election method so that one governing board member residing in each trustee area will be elected by the registered voters who reside in that trustee area (by “trustee area elections”). This public hearing will provide the opportunity for individuals and constituents to provide public comment and input regarding FCUSD’s proposal to change election methods. At the conclusion of the public hearing, the County Committee may approve or deny FCUSD’s proposal.

Chair Lefkovitz opened the Public Hearing at 5:39 p.m.

Dr. Sarah Koligian, Superintendent of FCUSD, gave a summary of the various hearings conducted in the district. She introduced National Demographics Corporation representatives, Doug Johnson and Justin Levitt.

Dr. Koligian stated that the public hearing tonight follows the public hearings we have held over the last two and a half months for transitioning to trustee areas. In March, there was an executive order by the governor that would have allowed us to pause, however, our board was determined to fulfill this process for trustee areas for the November election. In addition, we wanted to ensure that we gave additional opportunities for public hearings and comments. Rather than having the four required public hearings, our board decided to have six public hearings. We had public participation at each of our meetings which were held via Zoom. She invited the National Demographics Corporation (NDC) representatives, Dr. Doug Johnson and Dr. Justin Levitt to describe the process and the maps that were considered. Board President Chris Clark and Board Member David Reid may then provide comments on our recommended maps.

Dr. Levitt, NDC, shared a presentation describing the public hearing process, and FCUSD characteristics, demographics, communities of interest, and the redistricting criteria and considerations used in preparing the proposed FCUSD trustee area map. He then opened it up to FCUSD Board members for comments.

Dr. Reid provided comments regarding the proposal and is strongly in support of the map #5. This allows for two guaranteed reps from Folsom, 2 guaranteed reps from the city of Rancho Cordova, and 1 that could go either way.

Dr. Reid stated the Board, and he were very impressed with the process we went through in developing the proposed districts. The final result and map #5 really did accomplish what we were hoping for.

FCUSD Board President Clark, then gave his comments and support for this proposal, and map #5.

Board President Clark thanked Dr. Reid. We know that we were bound to have four public hearings, but we decided to have six instead to increase the public participation. We looked at two maps and decided on a map that we all agreed on. It's an opportunity for folks who want to get involved with the political process and run for office. We all feel comfortable with #5 and the process went smoothly. We entertained the public comments, and he totally supports of this proposed map.

Mr. Herrera read a public comment from Scott Rafferty expressing enthusiasm for the proposed FCUSD map.

The County Committee members asked questions and commented. FCUSD representatives responded to member questions.

Committee Member Keefer moved, and Committee Member Brown seconded the motion to approve the Folsom Cordova Unified School District's proposal to change to by trustee area elections and to adopt Resolution No. CC-20-02.

BACKGROUND:

The governing board of the San Juan Unified School District (SJUSD) has adopted and submitted a proposal to change the number and method of electing SJUSD governing board members. (Ed. Code, § 5019(a), (c).) Currently, the five SJUSD board members are elected by the registered voters of the entire school district ("at-large elections"). SJUSD proposes, effective for the November 2022 election, to increase the number of governing board members from five to seven, change its election method so one board member residing in each trustee area will be elected by the registered voters who reside in that trustee area (by "trustee area elections"), and establish the sequence of elections.

By law, the Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization (County Committee) must call and conduct a hearing on SJUSD's proposal and, at the conclusion of its hearing, approve or disapprove SJUSD's proposal. (Ed. Code, § 5019(c)(2).) As explained in more detail below, if it approves SJUSD's proposal, the County Committee will need to determine "by lot" the sequence of election dates for three uninhabited trustee areas. (Ed. Code, § 5021.)

PUBLIC HEARING PROCESS:

SJUSD's proposal and public website and other publicly available information indicate the following public hearings, outreach, and other events related to SJUSD's proposed change of election method, trustee area boundary maps, number of governing board members, and/or sequence of elections:

- March 10, 2020 – SJUSD held public hearing and adopted (1) Resolution No. 2982 declaring its intention to transition to "by-trustee area" elections, and (2) Resolution No. 2983 to seek a waiver from the State Board of Education of the Education Code requirements that proposed election method changes be submitted to school district voters for approval or denial.

- March 31, 2020 – Demographer presented to SJUSD on the process for changing to “by-trustee area” elections. SJUSD held a public hearing to obtain public input regarding the composition of trustee areas for board member elections before preparing draft boundary maps.
- April 9, 2020 – To protect public health and safety during the period when public health officials found it necessary to physical distance to prevent the spread of COVID-19, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-48-20 allowing political subdivisions, including school districts, to pause or “toll” the Elections Code 10010 timelines for changing to trustee area elections.
- April 14, 2020 – SJUSD pulled from its board meeting agenda a planned presentation and public hearing on the district’s election transition process to evaluate Governor Newsom’s Executive Orders and their effect on the district’s process.
- April 28, 2020 – SJUSD adopted Resolution No. 2991 to temporarily postpone hearings related to the board’s transition to by-trustee area elections until such time as neither state nor local public health officials recommend or impose COVID-19 social distancing measures.
- May 7, 2020 – State Board of Education approved SJUSD’s request to waive Education Code requirement that proposed election method changes be submitted to school district voters for approval or denial.
- June 8, 2021 – SJUSD reviewed the timeline and steps necessary to restart the transition process as COVID-19 pandemic conditions improve and health restrictions are expected to be eased.
- June 11, 2021 – Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-08-21, lifting the “tolling” of statutory timelines for changing to by trustee area elections, effective after June 30, 2021.
- June 22, 2021 – SJUSD reviewed the revised timeline and steps to restart the transition process based on Governor Newsom’s Executive Order N-08-21.
- June 30, 2021 – Governor Newsom’s Executive Order tolling the statutory timelines expired.
- July 1, 2021 – SJUSD heard demographer presentation, held a public hearing to obtain public input on the trustee-area map creation process, and adopted Resolution No. 3059 identifying the criteria for developing trustee-area boundaries.
- July 6, 2021 – SJUSD published eight proposed trustee area maps (four maps for the five trustee areas scenarios and four maps for the seven trustee areas scenarios), along with potential election sequencing schedules.
- July 13, 2021 – SJUSD heard demographer presentation and held public hearing to consider public input regarding proposed maps and whether SJUSD board should expand from five to seven members.

- July 14-15, 2021 – SJUSD held community meetings at six locations throughout the district and twice online via Zoom to allow community members to review the eight proposed maps and provide additional feedback. The community meetings were advertised throughout the district via flyers, emails, and telephone calls, and on the SJUSD website, where the information was provided in English, Spanish, Arabic, Farsi-Dari, Russian, and Ukrainian. Community members provided feedback in person, via the Zoom online meetings, and via Jamboards. Community input was posted on SJUSD’s website.
- July 20, 2021 – In response to community input about Citrus Heights and the North Highlands portion of Arden-Arcade, SJUSD’s demographer developed and published a ninth map and additional election sequencing schedules.
- July 27, 2021 – SJUSD held a public hearing to gather additional community input and adopted its proposal as set forth in Resolution No. 3065, which is further described below.
- In addition to SJUSD’s community outreach throughout the district, notices of SJUSD’s public hearings and process were posted on the SJUSD website (with content available in Spanish, Farsi, Arabic, Ukrainian, Pashto, and Russian) and published in the Sacramento Bee in English and Spanish.
- August 5, 2021 – County Committee to hear and consider SJUSD’s proposal to increase the number of SJUSD governing board members from five to seven, change to “by trustee area” elections, and establish the sequence of elections.

COUNTY COMMITTEE ROLE:

The County Committee must call and conduct a hearing and, at its conclusion, either approve or disapprove SJUSD’s proposal. (Ed. Code, § 5019(c)(2).)

SJUSD Resolution No. 3065 (Attachment 1) requests County Committee approval of SJUSD’s proposal to:

- (1) Change to “by trustee area” elections, implementing the SJUSD trustee area boundaries identified in the “Seven Trustee Areas-Conceptional Map No. 3.”
- (2) Increase the number of SJUSD board members from five to seven beginning with the November 2022 election, such that:
 - a. The two new board members will be elected at the November 2022 regularly scheduled election (rather than being appointed by SJUSD under Education Code section 5022).
 - b. The terms of the two new board seats will begin after the November 2022 election in accordance with Education Code section 5017. Therefore, the board will remain five members until the second Friday in December after the November 2022 election, at which time the board will be comprised of seven members.

(3) Sequence SJUSD elections as follows:

- a. Schedule Trustee Areas 3 and 5 for election in 2022;
- b. Schedule Trustee Areas 2 and 4 for election in 2024;
- c. Determine the election schedule for the three uninhabited Trustee Areas 1, 6, and 7 “by lot” in accordance with Education Code section 5021(a), with two of these trustee areas drawn by lot for election in 2022, and one trustee area drawn by lot for election in 2024.

The relevant statutes provide no guidelines or standards by which the County Committee must review a school district’s proposed plan. Therefore, the County Committee has discretion to consider SJUSD’s proposal in light of the local area concerned. Absent specific standards, government entities often give deference to the decisions of other governmental entities with more localized knowledge of the issue at hand, unless the local decision was arbitrary, capricious, or entirely lacking in evidentiary support. Thus, if the record reflects rational reasons for the local decision, the reasons are supported by evidence, and the decision is not in violation of the law, the County Committee may properly approve the proposal.

In the event that the County Committee approves SJUSD’s proposal after the public hearing, a proposed resolution (County Committee Resolution No. CC-21-01) is included for the County Committee’s consideration. If the County Committee denies SJUSD’s proposal, a resolution is not needed.

Approval by County Committee

1. The State Board of Education (SBE) has waived the requirement that SJUSD voters approve or deny the proposed change of election method. Therefore, if the County Committee approves SJUSD’s proposal to change to “by trustee area,” SJUSD will change to by trustee area elections beginning with the next SJUSD governing board election on November 8, 2022. Once 2020 Census data is available, SJUSD will be required to review and potentially update its trustee area maps based on the new data. (Ed. Code, § 5019.5)
2. Normally, school district voters approve or deny a proposal to increase or decrease the number of governing board members. (Ed. Code, § 5020(a).) However, SJUSD has asked SBE to waive this election requirement to avoid the costs associated with an election and to ensure implementation of the board member increase for the November 2022 election. (See SJUSD Resolution No. 3063, pp. VI.A.36.-38.) If SBE approves SJUSD’s election waiver request, the County Committee’s decision will be final, and SJUSD’s governing board will increase from five to seven. If SBE denies the waiver request, then an election will be called on this issue and the voters will decide the issue no later than the November 2022 election. (Ed. Code, § 5020(a).)¹

¹ When the number of board seats is increased from five to seven, the two additional members are normally appointed by the governing board, and these appointed members serve until the first Friday in December of the next or succeeding odd-numbered year. (Ed. Code, § 5022.) SJUSD’s will also ask SBE to waive this requirement so, instead of appointing two new board members whose terms would expire in odd-numbered, non-election years, both seats would be elected by the district’s voters in November 2022. If SBE denies this waiver, SJUSD may either make appointments for the vacant seats or potentially call a special election to fill them.

3. SJUSD board members are elected in even-numbered years and serve staggered four-year terms. The next election for the two SJUSD board members residing in proposed Trustee Areas 3 and 5 is scheduled for November 2022. The election for the remaining three board members (two residing in proposed Area 2, and one residing in proposed Area 4) is scheduled for November 2024.² If the County Committee approves SJUSD's proposal (1) SJUSD would maintain the same election sequence for the board members that currently inhabit Trustee Areas 2, 3, 4, and 5, and (2) the County Committee will determine the sequence of elections "by lot" for currently uninhabited Trustee Areas 1, 6 and 7. (Ed. Code, § 5021(a).)

Denial by County Committee

1. If the County Committee denies SJUSD's current proposal, SJUSD could conduct further public hearing(s) to consider and adopt an alternative plan and submit a revised proposal or take no further action and maintain the status quo.
2. If the County Committee denies SJUSD's proposal to change to by trustee area elections and/or does not act on a new proposal submitted under Education Code section 5019 before the Sacramento County Registrar's deadline (February 2, 2022), SJUSD's election method will remain as it is now for the November 2022 election, with five governing board members elected by the registered voters of the entire school district ("at-large elections").

SUPERINTENDENT'S RECOMMENDATION:

The County Superintendent of Schools recommends that the Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization hold a public hearing and approve or deny SJUSD's proposal.

² When trustee areas are established, any affected incumbent board member serves out his or her term of office and succeeding board members are nominated and elected in accordance with the new election method. (Ed. Code, § 5021(a).)

Dear Ms. Stinson:

I am writing today on behalf of the San Juan Unified School District (“District”), to respectfully submit the District Board of Education’s proposal to adopt by-trustee area elections and increase board membership from five to seven members, for approval by the Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization (“County Committee”).

The Board of Education (“board”) is currently elected under an “at-large” election system, where trustees are elected by voters of the entire District. Upon consideration of the California Voting Rights Act (“CVRA”), on March 10, 2020, the board adopted Resolution No. 2982, declaring its intent to transition from at-large to by-trustee area elections, where each board member must reside within the designated trustee area boundary, and is elected only by voters in that trustee area.

In early 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Orders N-34-20 (March 20, 2020) and N-48-20 (April 9, 2020) in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, “tolling” the timelines related to the District’s transition from at-large to by-trustee area elections. Due to the Governor’s Executive Orders, the District’s transition from at-large to by-trustee area board elections was placed on hold. On June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-08-21, lifting the “tolling” on the timelines related to the District’s transition from at-large to by-trustee area board elections, effective July 1, 2021. As a result, the District immediately resumed the transition process.

On July 27, 2021, after five public hearings on the proposed transition, the board adopted Resolution No. 3065, initiating the following proposal to the County Committee for approval:

1. The San Juan Unified School District Board of Education will transition to by-trustee area elections, implementing the trustee area boundaries identified in the map designated "Seven Trustee Areas - Conceptual Scenario 3."
2. The San Juan Unified School District Board of Education will increase from five board members to seven members commencing with the November 2022, election, such that:
 - a. the two new seats on the board will be elected at the November 2022, regularly scheduled board elections, and
 - b. the terms of the two new seats on the board will begin on the second Friday in December after the 2022, election in accordance with Education Code section 5017.
3. The San Juan Unified School District Board of Education elections will be sequenced according to the following schedule:
 - a. Trustee areas 3 and 5 will be scheduled for election in 2022;
 - b. Trustee areas 2 and 4 will be scheduled for election in 2024; and
 - c. The three vacant trustee areas (Areas 1, 6, and 7) shall be scheduled for election by the County Committee "by lot" in accordance with Education Code section 5021, such that two trustee areas shall be drawn by lot for election in 2022, and one trustee area shall be drawn by lot for election in 2024.

As indicated in Resolution 3065, in initiating this proposal, the board took all necessary steps to comply with the appropriate procedures and policies of law and conducted extensive public outreach.


Education Code sections 5019 and 5030 authorize the County Committee to approve the board's proposed change from at-large to by-trustee area elections and approve an increase in board membership from five to seven members. When such a proposal is made, the County Committee shall call and conduct at least one public hearing within the District making the proposal on the matter, and at the conclusion of the hearing, shall approve or disapprove the proposal. (Education Code section 5019, subd. (c)(2).)

In preparation for the County Committee meeting, currently scheduled for August 5, 2021, I would like to present the District's proposal to adopt by-trustee area elections and increase board membership from five to seven members. As part of this proposal, please find the following documents enclosed with this letter:

- Resolution No. 3065: *Initiating a Proposal to the Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization for the Adoption of By-Trustee Area Elections and Increase in Board Membership from Five to Seven Members.* (Exhibit "1")
- The trustee area map selected by the board at the July 27, 2021, board meeting ("Seven Trustee Areas-Conceptual Scenario 3"). (Exhibit "2")
- The election sequencing schedule selected by the board at the July 27, 2021 board meeting. (Exhibit "3")
- Resolution No. 3063: *Authorizing the District to Seek a Waiver from the State Board of Education Regarding an Increase in Board Membership from Five to Seven Members.* (Exhibit "4")
- A packet detailing the District's community outreach efforts during the hearing process. (Exhibit "5")

**RESOLUTION INITIATING A PROPOSAL TO THE SACRAMENTO COUNTY
COMMITTEE ON SCHOOL DISTRICT ORGANIZATION FOR THE ADOPTION OF
BY-TRUSTEE AREA ELECTIONS AND INCREASE IN BOARD MEMBERSHIP
FROM FIVE TO SEVEN MEMBERS
(SEVEN TRUSTEE AREAS)**

WHEREAS, the Board of Education (“board”) of the San Juan Unified School District (“district”) is elected “at-large,” meaning that each trustee is elected by voters of the entire district;

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the board adopted Resolution No. 2982, declaring its intent to transition from at-large to by-trustee area board elections, where each trustee must reside within a designated trustee area boundary, and is elected only by the voters in that trustee area (**Exhibit A**);

WHEREAS, pursuant to Elections Code section 10010 and other applicable provisions of law, the board held a public hearing on March 31, 2020, to gather public input regarding potential trustee area boundaries;

WHEREAS, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Governor Newsom issued Executive Orders N-34-20 and N-48-20, “tolling” the timelines related to the district’s transition from at-large to by-trustee area elections;

WHEREAS, due to the Governor’s Executive Orders, the district’s transition from at-large to by-trustee area board elections was placed on hold, pursuant to Resolution No. 2991 (**Exhibit B**);

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-08-21, lifting the “tolling” on the timelines related to the district’s transition from at-large to by-trustee area board elections effective after June 30, 2021;

WHEREAS, on July 1, 2021, the board held a second public hearing to gather community input regarding potential trustee area boundaries, and adopted Resolution No. 3059, identifying the criteria that the demographer would consider in developing trustee area boundaries (**Exhibit C**);

WHEREAS, on July 6, 2021, the board published eight trustee area maps along with potential options for sequencing of elections. Four of the eight maps included five (5) trustee areas (Five Trustee Areas-Conceptual Scenarios Numbers 1-4) and the remaining four maps included seven (7) trustee areas (Seven Trustee Areas-Conceptual Scenarios 1-4);

WHEREAS, the board held a public hearing on July 13, 2021 to gather community input with regard to the proposed maps and whether the board should expand its composition from five to seven members;

WHEREAS, on July 14, 2021, and July 15, 2021, the district held multiple community outreach meetings at Dyer-Kelly Elementary School, Greer Elementary School, Mira Loma High School, Mesa Verde High School, Casa Roble High School, the district office (3738 Walnut Avenue, Carmichael), and online twice via Zoom, to allow members of the community to review the eight (8) proposed maps and provide additional feedback. Community members participated in the meetings and provided feedback in person at the locations identified, feedback via the Zoom online meetings, and feedback via Jamboards. Input received from the community was posted on the district's website. The community meetings were advertised throughout the district via flyers, emails, and telephone calls, and on the district's website, where the information was provided in the languages of English, Spanish, Arabic, Farsi-Dari, Pashto, Russian, and Ukrainian;

WHEREAS, in response to community input about Citrus Heights and the North Highlands portion of Arden-Arcade, the district's demographer developed a ninth map, designated as Seven Trustee Areas-Conceptual Scenario No. 5;

WHEREAS, on July 20, 2021, the district published the map designated as Seven Trustee Areas-Conceptual Scenario No. 5, and additional potential election sequencing options for each of the nine potential trustee area maps;

WHEREAS, the board held a public hearing on July 27, 2021 to gather additional community input;

WHEREAS, throughout this process, the district conducted expansive outreach to the community, including publishing notices in the Sacramento Bee, holding community outreach meetings, and providing translation services into Spanish, Arabic, Farsi-Dari, Pashto, Russian, and Ukrainian;

WHEREAS, Education Code sections 5019, 5030 and other applicable provisions of law authorize the Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization ("County Committee"), upon application from a school district's governing board, to change the method of election in a school district under its jurisdiction;

WHEREAS, Education Code section 5020 requires the County Committee's resolution approving the change to by-trustee area elections be submitted to the electorate for its approval;

WHEREAS, Education Code section 5019 authorizes the County Committee upon application from a school district's governing board, to increase board membership from five to seven members;

WHEREAS, Education Code section 5020 requires the County Committee's resolution approving the increase in board membership to be submitted to the electorate for its approval;

WHEREAS, Education Code sections 33050-33053 authorize the State Board of Education to waive the voter approval requirement, which could reduce the costs associated with the proposed change to trustee area elections and ensure timely implementation;

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the board adopted Resolution No. 2983, authorizing the superintendent to seek a waiver of the election requirement of Education Code section 5020 from the State Board of Education (**Exhibit D**);

WHEREAS, during its May 2020 meeting, the State Board of Education granted the district's waiver request, therefore waiving the election requirement related to the board's transition to by-trustee area elections; and

WHEREAS, in an abundance of caution, the board will consider seeking an additional waiver from the State Board of Education to waive the election requirement related to an increase in board membership, as well as portions of other Education Code sections related to the increase in board membership to ensure timely implementation for the November 2022, election.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, after a public hearing on the matter, the Board of Education of the San Juan Unified School District hereby resolves as follows:

1. The above recitals are correct and true.
2. The board hereby approves, and recommends that the County Committee approve, the adoption of by-trustee area elections and the trustee area map set forth in **Exhibit E**, which has been designated as Seven Trustee Areas-Conceptual Scenario # 3.
3. The board hereby approves, and recommends that the County Committee approve, an increase in district board membership from five to seven members commencing with the November 2022 election, such that: (A) the two new seats on the board will be elected at the November 2022 regularly scheduled board elections, and (2) the terms of the two new seats on the board will begin on the second Friday in December after the 2022 election in accordance with Education Code section 5017. Therefore, the board will remain at five members until the second Friday in December (December 9, 2022) after the 2022 election, at which time the board will be comprised of seven members.
4. The board hereby approves, and recommends that the County Committee approve, the following sequencing of elections:
 - a. *If Seven Trustee Areas-Conceptual Scenario 2 is selected:*
 - i. Upon giving special consideration to the purposes of the California Voting Rights Act, and after taking into account the preferences expressed by members of the district, the board hereby proposes that:
 1. Trustee areas _____, _____, and _____ be scheduled for election in 2022; and
 2. Trustee areas _____ and _____, be scheduled for election in 2024; and

3. The two vacant trustee areas _____ and _____ shall be scheduled for election by the County Committee "by lot" in accordance with Education Code section 5021, such that one trustee areas shall be drawn by lot for election in 2022, and one trustee area shall be drawn by lot for election in 2024.

b. *If Seven Trustee Areas-Conceptual Scenario 1, 3, 4, or 5 is selected:*

- i. Upon giving special consideration to the purposes of the California Voting Rights Act, and after taking into account the preferences expressed by members of the district, the board hereby proposes that:

1. Trustee areas 3 and 5 be scheduled for election in 2022; and

2. Trustee areas 2 and 4, be scheduled for election in 2024; and

3. The three vacant trustee areas 1, 6, and 7 shall be scheduled for election by the County Committee "by lot" in accordance with Education Code section 5021, such that two trustee areas shall be drawn by lot for election in 2022, and one trustee area shall be drawn by lot for election in 2024.

5. The district superintendent or designee is hereby authorized and directed to send a copy of this Resolution to the County Committee, and to work with the County Committee, the County Clerk-Recorder's Office, the California Department of Education, and the State Board of Education, to conduct any acts necessary to effectuate the purposes of this Resolution and to ensure that by-trustee area elections and the increase from five to seven board members can be implemented in the election cycles scheduled in 2022 and 2024.

**INTENT TO TRANSITION FROM AT-LARGE TO BY-TRUSTEE AREA BOARD
ELECTIONS**

WHEREAS, the Board of Education ("Board") of the San Juan Unified School District ("District") is elected "at-large," meaning that each Board member is elected by voters of the entire District;

WHEREAS, Board members are elected in even-numbered years and serve staggered, four-year terms, such that the next election for three Board members is scheduled for November 2020, with the remaining two Board members scheduled for election in November 2022;

WHEREAS, the adoption of "by-trustee area" elections will not affect the terms of any Board members serving or elected during this transition, each of whom will serve out his or her full term;

WHEREAS, under the California Voting Rights Act ("CVRA"), at-large elections are impermissible if they result in racially polarized voting. Racially polarized voting is defined as "voting in which there is a difference . . . in the choice of candidates or other electoral choices that are preferred by voters in a protected class, and in the choice of candidates and electoral choices that are preferred by voters in the rest of the electorate;"

WHEREAS, transitioning from at-large to "by-trustee area" elections, where each Board member must reside within a designated trustee area boundary, and is elected only by the voters in that trustee area, minimizes the potential for litigation against the District under the CVRA;

WHEREAS, the Board understands the importance of fair and accessible elections, greatly values the opinions and voices of all members of the District's community, and desires to increase the ability of candidates to seek elected office;

WHEREAS, while the Board does not believe that its current form of elections violate the CVRA, it does believe that it is in the public's best interest to begin the process to transition from at-large to by-trustee area elections;

WHEREAS, the Board will hold a minimum of two public hearings to seek public input regarding the composition of the trustee areas prior to developing proposed trustee-area boundary maps;

WHEREAS, the Board, with assistance from a demographer, will hold a minimum of two additional public hearings to seek public input on the proposed trustee-area maps developed and on the proposed sequence of elections;

WHEREAS, the Board will hold an additional public hearing before adopting a trustee-area map and submitting it to the Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization ("County Committee") for consideration;

WHEREAS, Education Code sections 5019 and 5030 authorize the County Committee, upon application of the Board, to change the method of election of the Board from at-large to by-trustee area;

WHEREAS, if the County Committee approves this request to change the method of electing Board members, Education Code section 5020 requires the County Committee's resolution of approval to be submitted to the electorate for its approval; and

WHEREAS, in the alternative, the District may seek a waiver of this voter approval requirement from the State Board of Education, pursuant to Education Code sections 33050-33053.


THEREFORE, the Board of Education of the San Juan Unified School District hereby resolves as follows:

1. The above recitals are correct and true.
2. This Resolution is passed and adopted pursuant to Elections Code section 10010, subd. (e)(3)(A).
3. The District shall commence the process of transition to by-trustee area elections, in full compliance with all appropriate procedures and policies provided in law, including but not limited to Education Code sections 5019, 5030, and 33050, *et seq.*, and Elections Code sections 10010 and 14025, *et seq.*, with the intention of completing the process within 90 days of this Resolution's passage.
4. Staff is directed to engage a demographer, legal counsel, and any other consultant deemed required to assist in the development of proposed by-trustee area boundaries.
5. The District Superintendent/designee is hereby authorized and directed to take any other actions necessary to effectuate the purposes of this resolution.

Declaring Intent to Temporarily Postpone Hearings Related to the Board's Transition to By-Trustee Area Elections Until Such Time As Neither State Nor Local Public Health Officials Recommend or Impose Social Distancing Measures

WHEREAS, the Board of Education ("board") of the San Juan Unified School District ("district") is elected "at-large," meaning that each trustee is elected by voters of the entire district;

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the board adopted Resolution #2982, declaring its intent to transition from at-large to by-trustee area board elections;

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-26-20, addressing the possibility of potential school closures as a result of the COVID-19 Pandemic;

WHEREAS, on March 16, 2020, all district schools were closed in response to the COVID-19 Pandemic;

WHEREAS, on March 19, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-33-20, requiring all individuals living in the State of California to stay home or at their place of residence, except in limited circumstances;

WHEREAS, on March 19, 2020, the Sacramento County Health Officer directed all individuals living in the county to stay at their place of residence except for essential activities;

WHEREAS, on March 20, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-34-20, postponing the public hearing timelines related to the transition from at-large to by-trustee area elections, due to health and safety concerns caused by the COVID-19 Pandemic;

WHEREAS, at a special meeting of the Board of Education, the board held a public hearing on March 31, 2020, telephonically, to gather public input regarding potential trustee area boundaries;

WHEREAS, despite outreach and notice, the district received little public input at the March 31, 2020, meeting, most likely because of the COVID-19 Pandemic;

WHEREAS, on April 9, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-48-20 to clarify his previous Executive Order N-34-20. Specifically, the Governor ordered that both the public hearing and safe harbor timelines associated with a transition from at-large to by-trustee area elections were to be tolled, effective March 20, 2020, until such time as neither state nor local public health officials recommend or impose social distancing measures in the relevant subdivision;

WHEREAS, Governor Newsom explained that holding these public hearings "in the near future—at a time when public health requires that Californians stay home except for essential

needs—would threaten public health and safety, and would force Californians to choose between fully participating in their democratic process and safeguarding their own health and safety, as well as the health and safety of their communities;”

WHEREAS, the board remains committed to the process of transitioning from at-large to by-trustee area elections, but agrees with Governor Newsom, that it is not in the best interest of the health and safety of our local communities to hold these hearings right now; and

WHEREAS, continuing the public hearing process at a later date, when social distancing measures have been lifted, will promote greater public participation in the transition process, and minimize risk to the health and safety of our community.


NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Board of Education of the San Juan Unified School District hereby resolves as follows:

Pursuant to Executive Orders N-34-20 and N-48-20, the board will temporarily postpone the public hearing process related to the board’s transition from at-large to trustee area elections, effectively immediately, until such time as neither state nor local public health officials recommend or impose social distancing measures;
3. When social distancing measures have been lifted, the superintendent shall recommence the hearing process in the manner provided by law and in accordance with the Governor’s Orders, beginning with Pre-Map Hearing Number 2, and the possible adoption of criteria to guide the establishment of trustee-areas, as described in attached Exhibit “A;”
4. The superintendent or designee is hereby authorized to take any other actions appropriate to effectuate the purposes of this resolution or the district’s goals with respect to the transition to by-trustee area voting.

WHEREAS, the Board of Education ("board") of the San Juan Unified School District ("district") is elected "at-large," meaning that each trustee is elected by voters of the entire district; and

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the board adopted Resolution No. 2982, declaring its intent to transition from at-large to by-trustee area board elections; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Elections Code section 10010(a)(1), the board held a public hearing on March 31, 2020, to gather public input regarding potential trustee area boundaries; and

WHEREAS, due to the COVID-19 pandemic and Governor Newsom's Executive Orders N-34-20 and N-38-20, the District's transition from at-large to by-trustee area board elections was placed on hold until such time as neither state nor local public health officials recommend or impose social distancing measures due to the COVID-19 pandemic, pursuant to Resolution No. 2991; and

WHEREAS, On June 11, 2021, the Governor executed Executive Order N-08-21, which stated in part: "The following provisions [which include Executive Order N-48-20] shall remain in place and shall have full force and effect through June 30, 2021, upon which time they will expire subject to individual conditions described in the enumerated paragraphs."; and

WHEREAS, on July 1, 2021, pursuant to Elections Code section 10010(a)(1), the board held a second public hearing to gather public input regarding potential trustee area boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Voting Rights Act (42 U.S.C. section 1973) prohibits the use of any voting qualification, or prerequisite to voting, or standard, practice, or procedure, in a manner which results in a denial or abridgement of the right of any citizen of the United States to vote on account of race or color; and

WHEREAS, federal law and the Equal Protection Clause require that each trustee-area be equal in population; however, deviations (less than five percent [5%] greater than or less than the ideal, for a total of ten percent [10%] deviation) are presumptively constitutional under the Equal Protection Clause where required to meet an official criteria; and

WHEREAS, the board has instructed its demographer and district staff to develop draft maps to identify trustee areas that fully comply with legal requirements; and

WHEREAS, the board wishes to provide official criteria for any needed deviations from the general rule of equal population; and

WHEREAS, the board has instructed its demographer to utilize these criteria insofar as practicable, recognizing that not all criteria will carry the same weight in every draft map; and

WHEREAS, the draft maps will be used by the board to study the possible change to trustee area elections, and to inform and solicit further input from the public.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Board of Education of the San Juan Unified School District hereby resolves as follows:

1. The above recitals are correct and true.
2. The board hereby adopts the following criteria, identified in the attached Exhibit A, to guide the demographer and district staff in the development of draft maps and in relation to any necessary deviations as described above.



- ☒ 1. The boundaries of the trustee areas shall be established so that the trustee areas are at least as nearly equal in population as required by law.
- ☒ 2. The boundaries of the trustee areas shall not be gerrymandered in violation of the principles established by the United States Supreme Court in *Shaw v. Reno*, 509 U.S. 630 (1993), and other applicable law.
- ☒ 3. The boundaries of the trustee areas shall be established so that the trustee areas do not result in a denial or abridgement of the right of any citizen to vote on account of race or color as provided in Section 2 of the federal Voting Rights Act.
- ☒ 4. The boundaries of the trustee areas may be compact, insofar as practicable.
- ☒ 5. The boundaries of the trustee areas may be created to contain contiguous territory, insofar as practicable.
- ☒ 6. The boundaries of the trustee areas may observe communities of interest.

PROPOSED CHANGE FROM AT-LARGE TO BY-TRUSTEE BOARD ELECTIONS**

WHEREAS, the Board of Education ("Board") of the San Juan Unified School District ("District") is elected "at-large," meaning that each Board member is elected by voters of the entire District;

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the Board will consider adopting Resolution #2982, declaring its intent to transition from at-large to by-trustee area Board elections;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Elections Code section 10010, subdivision (a)(1), the Board will hold two public hearings to gather public input regarding potential trustee-area boundaries;

WHEREAS, the District, with assistance from a demographer, will hold a minimum of two additional public hearings to seek public input on the proposed trustee area maps developed and on the proposed sequence of elections;

WHEREAS, the District will hold an additional public hearing before adopting a trustee-area map and submitting it to the Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization ("County Committee") for consideration;

WHEREAS, Education Code sections 5019 and 5030 authorize the County Committee, upon application of the District Board, to change the method of election of the Board from at-large to by-trustee area;

WHEREAS, if the County Committee approves this request to change the method of electing Board members, Education Code section 5020 requires the County Committee's resolution of approval to be submitted to the electorate for its approval;

WHEREAS, an election to approve the change in voting methods will result in a cost to the District, and Education Code sections 33050-33053 authorize the State Board of Education to waive this voter approval requirement, which could reduce the cost and expedite the timeline for implementation of the by-trustee area elections;

WHEREAS, in light of the above, the Board wishes to request that the State Board of Education waive the election requirement set forth in the Education Code;

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the Board held a public hearing on the proposed waiver application to solicit input from the public and the District's stakeholders;

WHEREAS, the District properly posted a timely notice of the public hearing in the Sacramento Bee and at various sites within the District; and

WHEREAS, the District complied with the notice and consulting requirements set forth in Education Code sections 33050, *et seq.*

THEREFORE, the Board of Education of the San Juan Unified School District hereby resolves as follows:

1. The Board hereby authorizes the Superintendent/designee to seek a full waiver of Education Code section 5020, and partial waivers of Education Code sections 5019, 5021, and 5030 to effectuate the District's goal of moving to a by-trustee area elections system without electorate approval.
2. The District Superintendent/designee is hereby authorized and directed to take any other actions necessary to effectuate the purposes of this resolution.


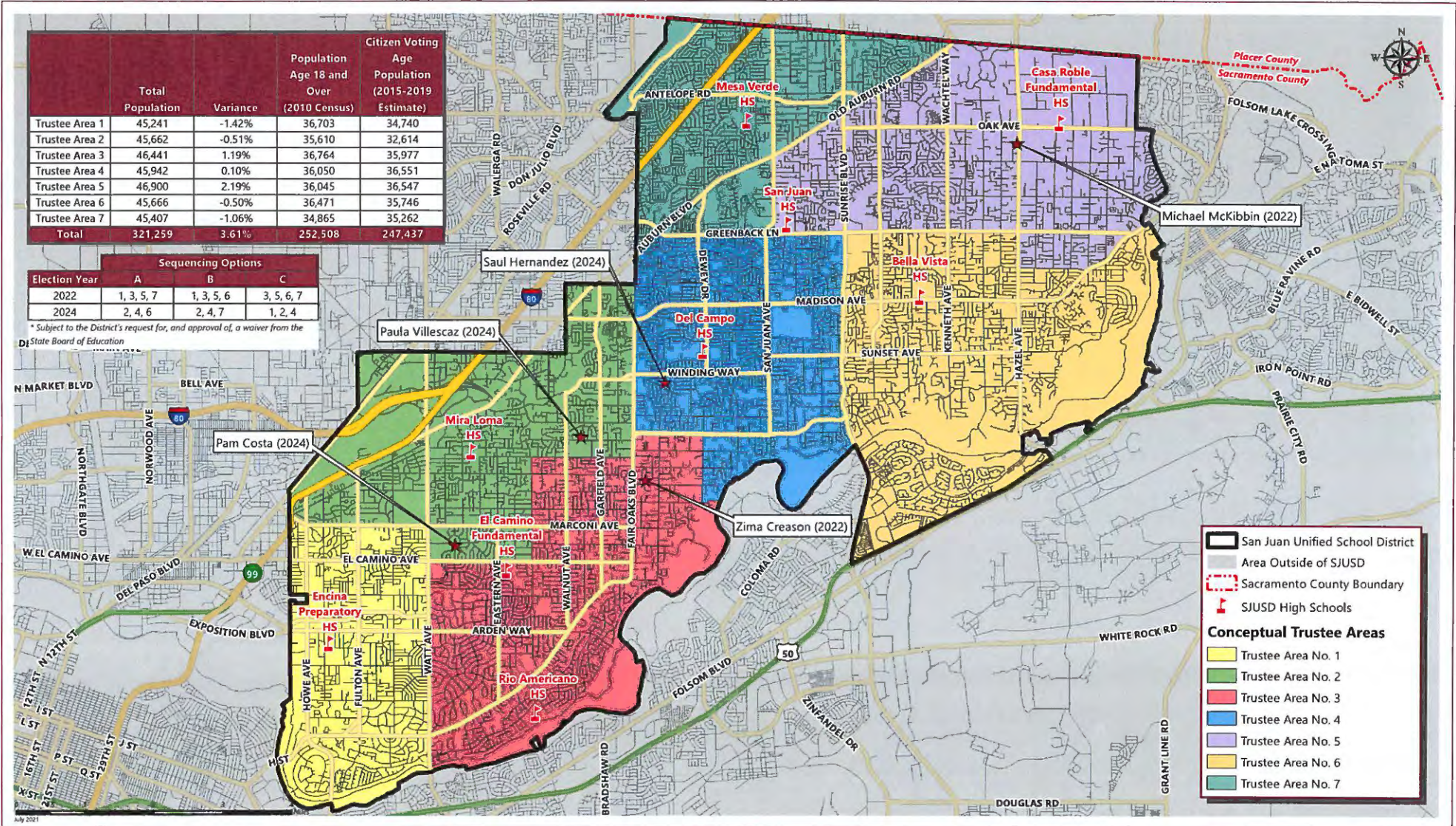

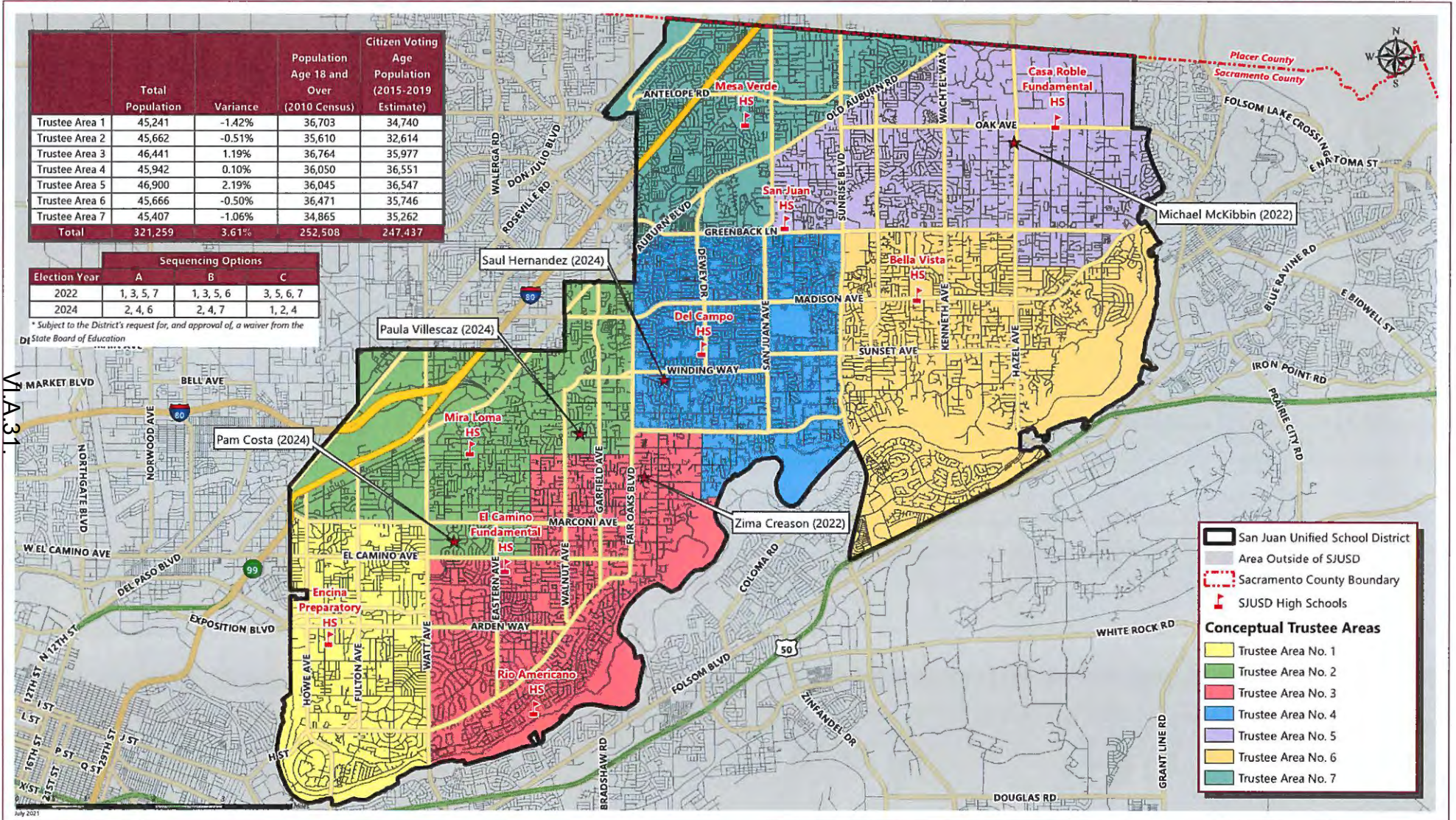

**RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE DISTRICT TO SEEK A WAIVER FROM THE
STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION REGARDING AN INCREASE IN BOARD
MEMBERSHIP FROM FIVE TO SEVEN MEMBERS**

WHEREAS, the Board of Education (“board”) of the San Juan Unified School District (“district”) is elected “at-large,” meaning that each board member is elected by voters of the entire district;

WHEREAS, on July 27, 2021, the board will consider adopting Resolution No. 3065, initiating a proposal to the Sacramento County Committee on School District organization (“County Committee”) to: (1) adopt by-trustee area elections, where each trustee must reside within a designated trustee area boundary, and is elected only by the voters in that trustee area, and (2) increase board membership from five to seven members;

WHEREAS, the Education Code authorizes the County Committee, upon application from a school district’s governing board, to change the method of election in a school district under its jurisdiction, and increase board membership from five to seven members;

WHEREAS, Education Code section 5020 requires the County Committee’s resolution approving the change to by-trustee area elections be submitted to the electorate for its approval;

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the board adopted Resolution No. 2983, authorizing the superintendent to seek a waiver of the Education Code section 5020’s election requirement from the State Board of Education;

WHEREAS, in May 2020, the State Board of Education granted the district’s waiver request, thereby waiving the election requirement related to the board’s transition to by-trustee area elections;

WHEREAS, Education Code section 5020 similarly requires the County Committee’s resolution approving the increase in board membership to be submitted to the electorate for its approval;

WHEREAS, an election to approve the increase in board membership will result in a cost to the district, and Education Code sections 33050-33053 authorize the State Board of Education to waive this voter approval requirement;

WHEREAS, when a governing board increases from five to seven members, Education Code section 5022 requires the board to appoint the two new members “with the term of one of those two additional appointees being designated to expire on the first Friday in December of the next succeeding odd-numbered year and the term of the other appointee being designated to expire on the first Friday in December of the second succeeding odd-numbered year.”

WHEREAS, the board believes it is in the public interest to waive Education Code section 5022's appointment requirement because:

- The board believes the public will be better served with the two new board members being *elected*, rather than appointed;
- Education Code section 5022 requires that the two new appointed board members terms expire in odd-numbered years. However, the district's elections are held in even-numbered years. Therefore, should Education Code section 5022 *not be waived*, vacancies will automatically occur on the board in 2023 and 2025; and
- Education Code section 5022 incorrectly states that board member terms expire on the first Friday in December even though Education Code section 5017 now states that terms for school board members expire on the *second* Friday in December.

WHEREAS, as described above, following the appointment process provided in Education Code section 5022 is inconsistent with the district's current election system, creates legal problems, and cannot be effectively implemented consistent with the district's desires, and Education Code sections 33050-33053 authorize the State Board of Education to waive this statute;

WHEREAS, the board finds that it is more logical, and would better serve the district's community, to seek a waiver of Education Code section 5022, to allow the increase in board membership to occur during the November 2022 election, such that: (A) the two new seats on the Board will be elected at the November 2022 regularly scheduled board elections, and (2) the terms of the two new seats on the board will begin on the second Friday in December after the 2022 election in accordance with Education Code section 5017. Therefore, the board will remain at five members until the second Friday in December (December 9, 2022) after the 2022 election, at which time the board will be comprised of seven members;

WHEREAS, in light of the above, the board requests that the State Board of Education waive the election requirements noted above, as well as the requirements of Education Code section 5022;

WHEREAS, on July 27, 2021, the board held a public hearing on the proposed waiver application to solicit input from the public and the District's stakeholders;

WHEREAS, the district properly posted a notice of the public hearing in the Sacramento Bee and at various sites within the District; and

WHEREAS, the district complied with the notice and consulting requirements set forth in Education Code sections 33050, *et seq.*

THEREFORE, the Board of Education of the San Juan Unified School District hereby resolves as follows:

1. The board hereby authorizes the superintendent/designee to seek a waiver of the relevant Education Code sections, including but not limited to, sections 5020 and


5022, in order to effectuate the district's goal of increasing board membership from five to seven members, with the additional two board seats to be filled during the November 2022 regularly scheduled board election.

2. The district superintendent/designee is hereby authorized and directed to take any other actions necessary to effectuate the purposes of this resolution.

The San Juan Unified School District is in the process of changing how members of the Board of Education are elected to office from an "at-large" election to a "by-trustee area" election. As part of this process, the Board is considering increasing Board membership from five members to seven members. Should the Board choose to increase to seven members, the Board will hold a public hearing to consider whether to submit a waiver to the State Board of Education ("SBE") allowing for an increase in Board membership, without the requirement of an election.

If the County Committee approves the school district's application, California Education Code section 5020 would require an election to approve the increase in Board membership. To avoid the costs associated with an election and to ensure timely implementation, the Board is considering seeking a waiver from the SBE of this election requirement, as well as portions of other Education Code sections related to the process of increasing to seven members, including but not limited to Education Code section 5022 and 5091. If the waiver is granted by the SBE, no election to approve the increase in Board membership will take place, and the County Committee's decision on the District's application will be final. (Please note that in 2020, the SBE granted a similar District waiver request, to waive the election requirement related to the District's transition to by-trustee area elections. On March 31, 2020, the District's demographers, will present information on the process and potential criteria for drawing the trustee area boundary maps. Following the presentation, the Board will hold the first of two statutorily required hearings to receive input from the community on the trustee-area map creation process and election sequencing, pursuant to Elections Code section 10010, subdivision (a)(1).

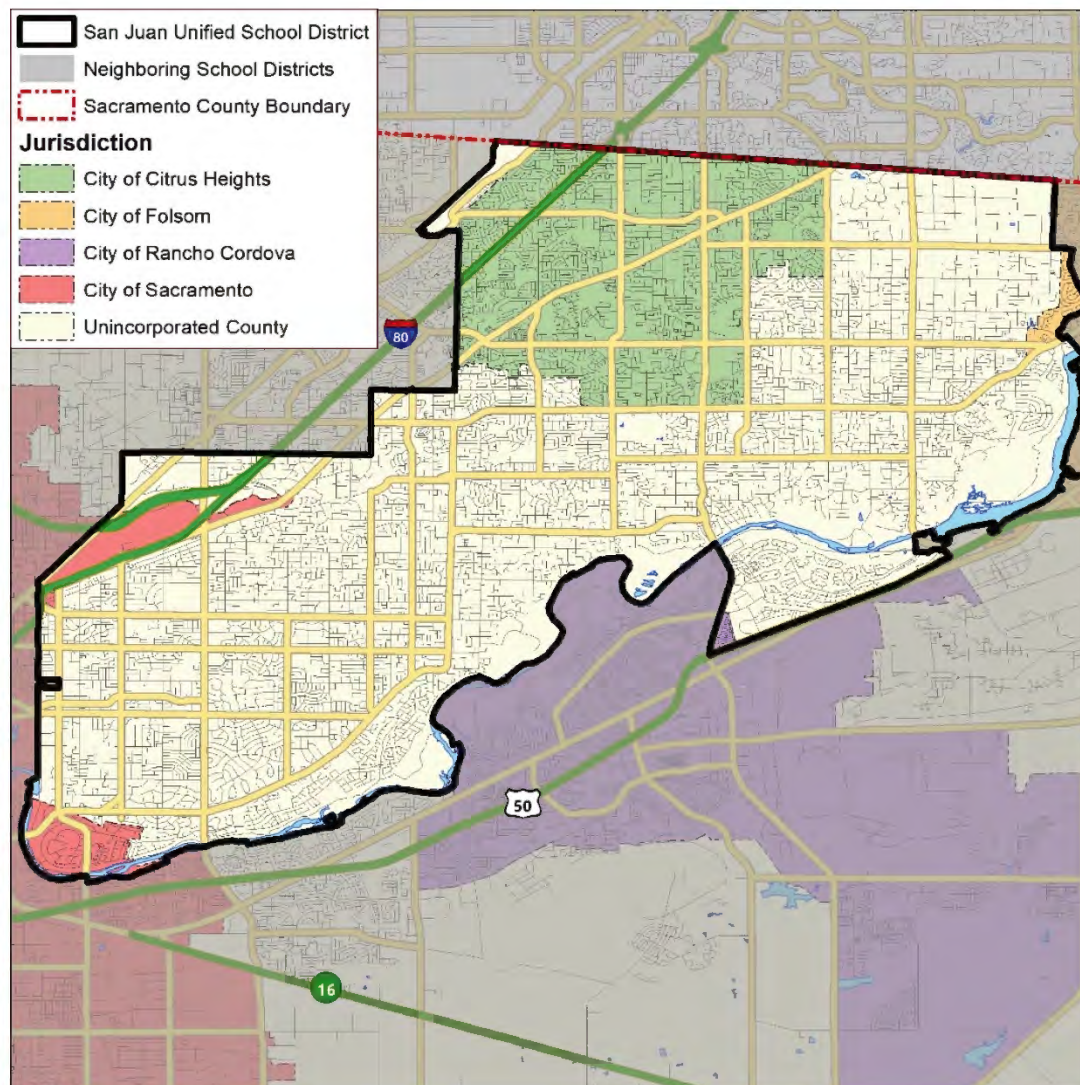

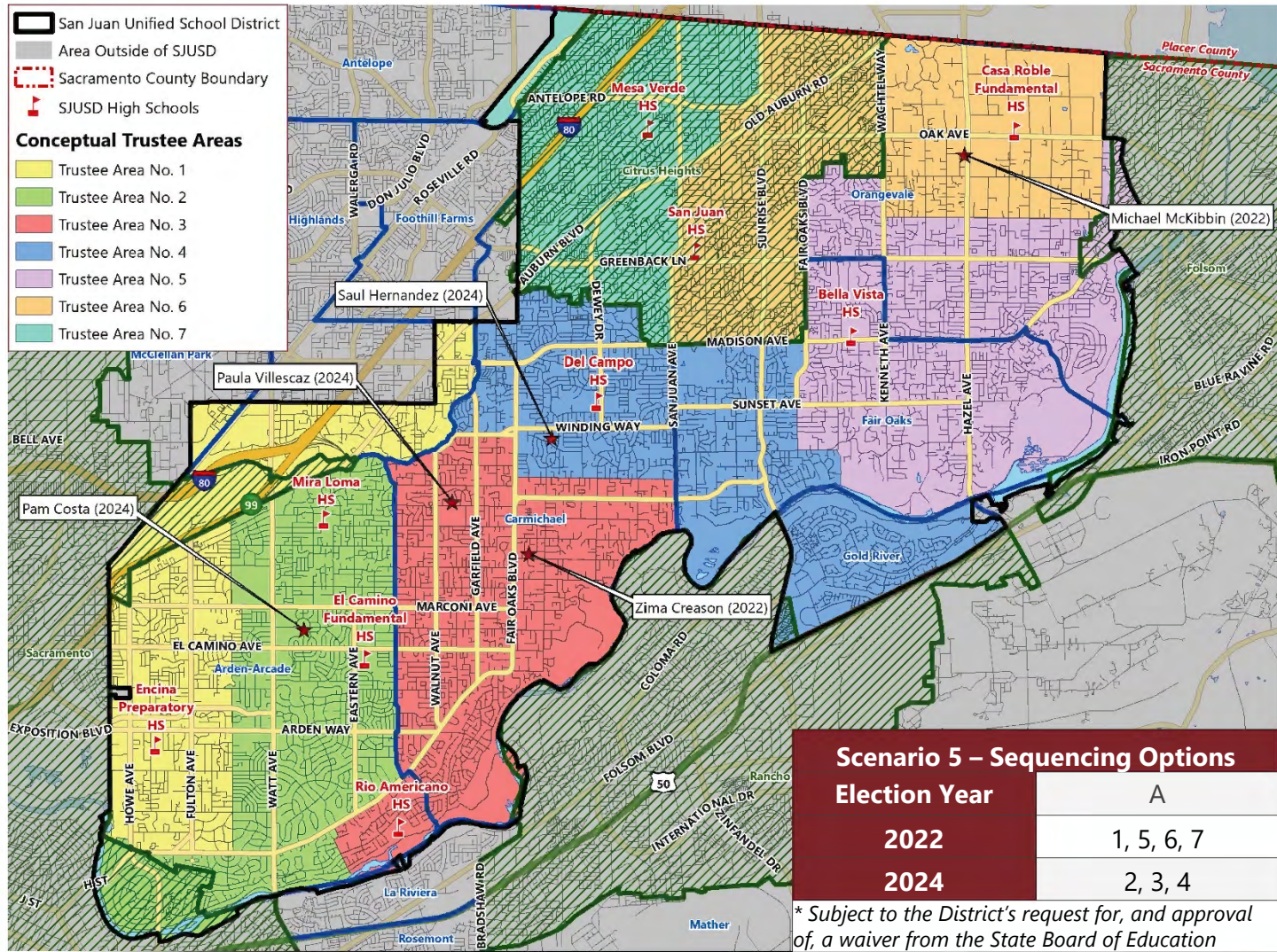

SBE Waiver – Voter Approval Requirement

- County Committee can approve an increase in board membership from five to seven.
- If the County Committee approves, the law requires an election for the voters to approve the increase in Board membership.
- To avoid the costs associated with an election and to ensure implementation during the November 2022 regularly scheduled board election, the board will consider seeking a waiver from the State Board of Education of this election requirement.

SBE Waiver – Legal Requirements

Upon an increase to seven (7) board members, Education Code section 5022 requires the board to:

- Appoint the two new members;
- With the term of one appointee to expire on the first Friday in December next succeeding the next **odd-numbered** year; and
- The term of the second appointee to expire on the first Friday in December of the second succeeding **odd-numbered** year.

SBE Waiver – Implementation Problems

Section 5022 is problematic because:

- The district's elections are held in even-numbered years, not odd years; and
- Education Code section 5022 incorrectly states that board member terms expire on the *first* Friday in December even though Education Code section 5017 was recently updated so that terms for school board members expire on the *second* Friday in December.

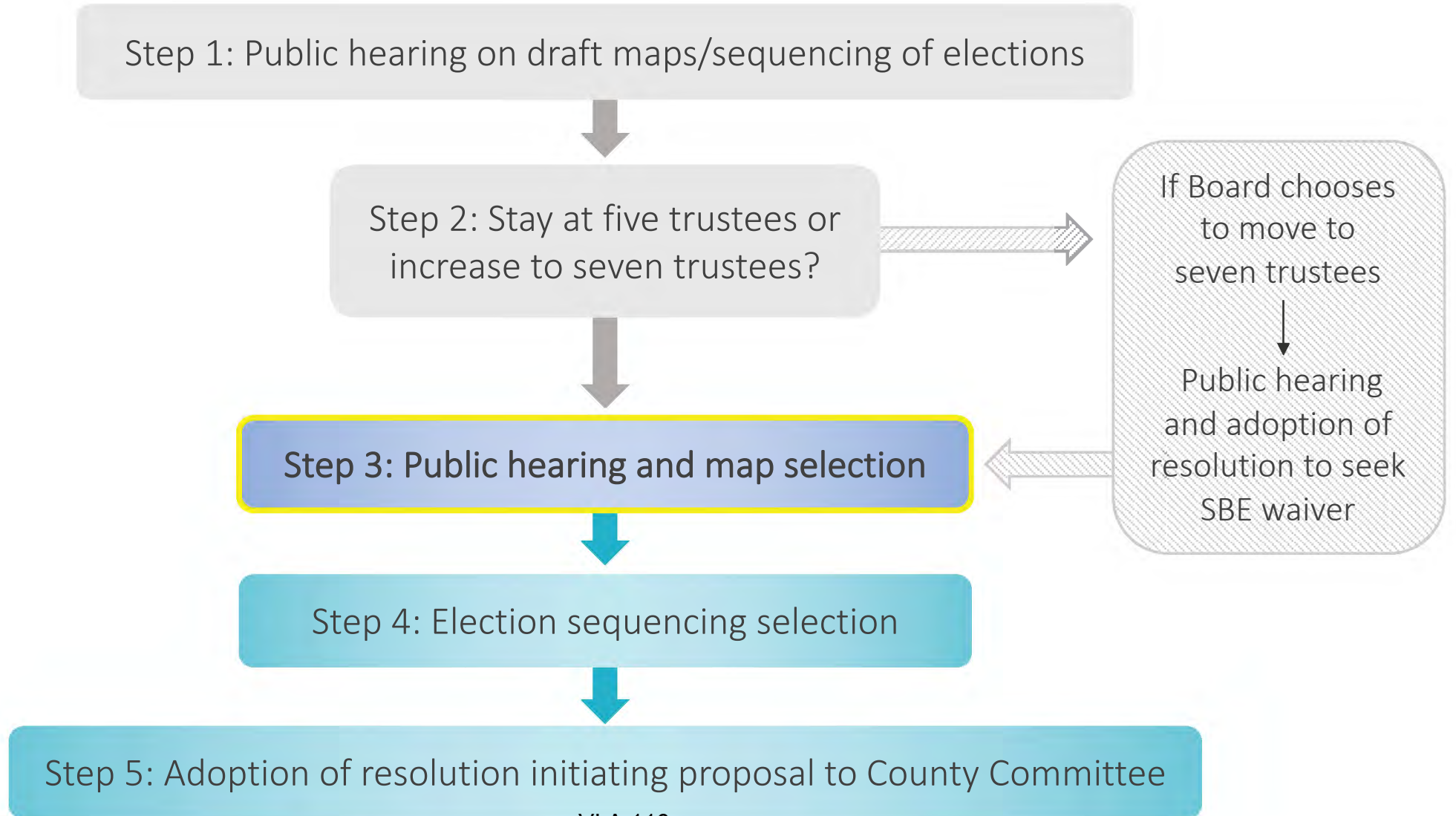
As a result, the board will consider seeking a waiver of this requirement, to allow the two new board members to be elected (rather than appointed) during the November 2022 election.

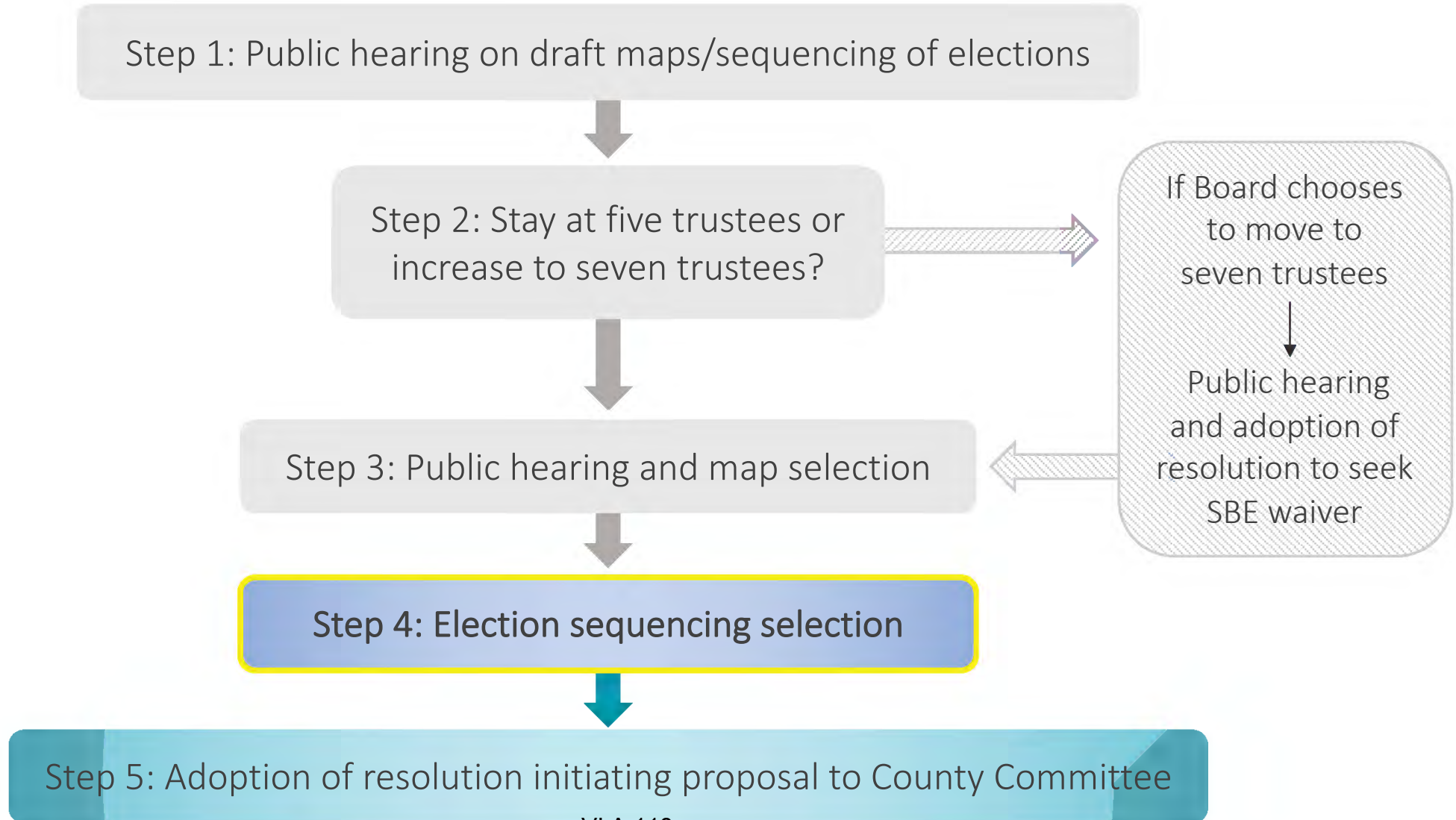

Election Sequencing Selection – General Considerations

- When a school board transitions to trustee area elections, each incumbent is afforded the right to serve out their four-year term, regardless of how the elections are sequenced. (Ed. Code, § 5021.)
- When there are multiple vacant trustee areas, the Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization must determine, “by lot” how those vacant trustee area elections will be sequenced. (Ed. Code, § 5021.)

Sequencing on a Five Member Board

- Current elections are staggered so that two seats on the board are scheduled for election in 2022, and three seats are scheduled for election in 2024.
- To maintain the current election sequencing schedules:
 - two trustee areas up for election in 2022
 - three trustee areas up for election in 2024

Sequencing on a Seven Member Board

- Current elections are staggered so that two seats on the board are scheduled for election in 2022, and three seats are scheduled for election in 2024.
- To ensure implementation of increase to seven board members during the 2022 regularly scheduled board elections:
 - four trustee areas up for election in 2022
 - three trustee areas up for election in 2024

- If during the July 27, 2021 meeting the board votes to seek an increase in membership to seven members, the resolution will also request that County Committee approve the increase in board membership.



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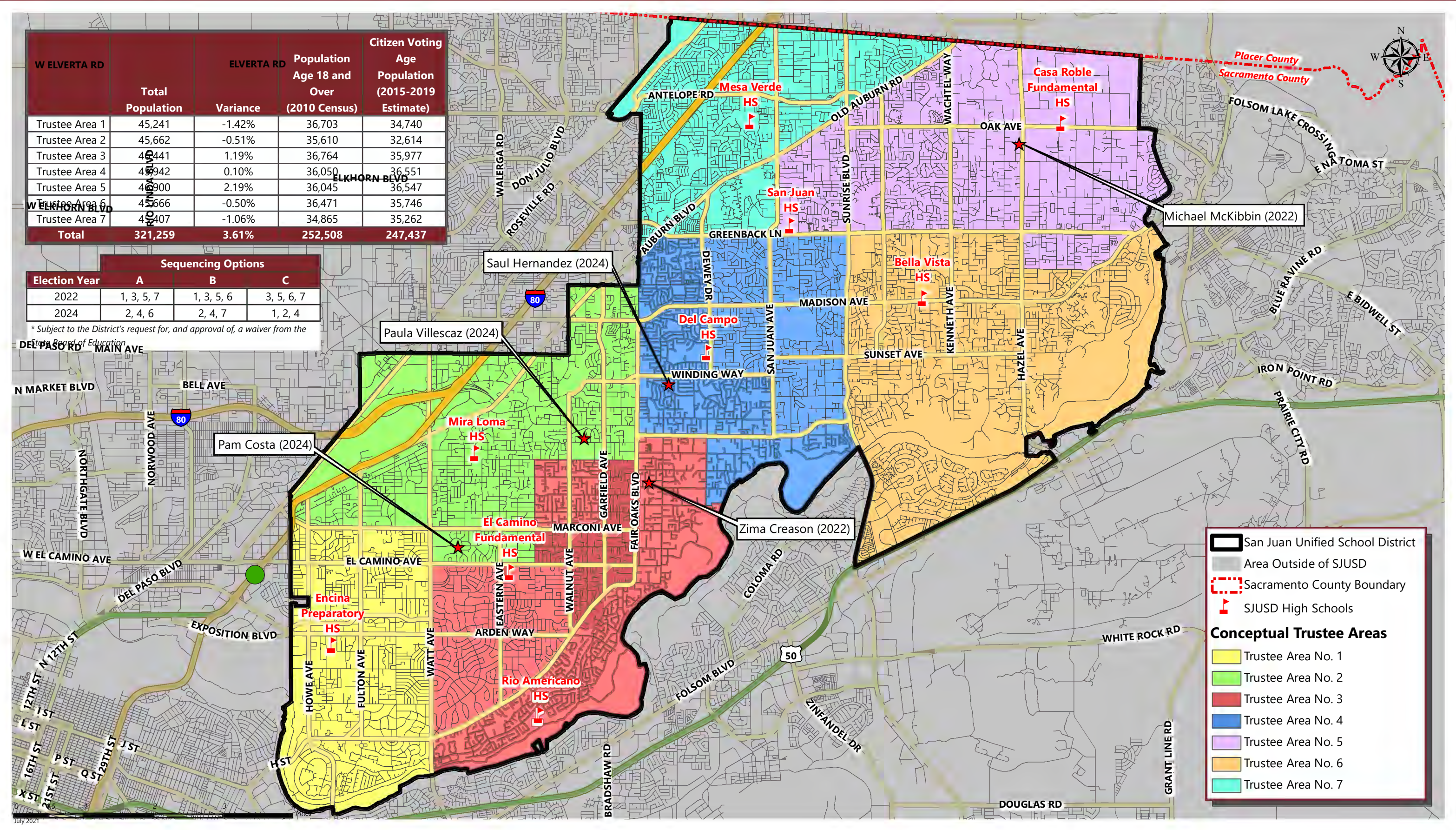

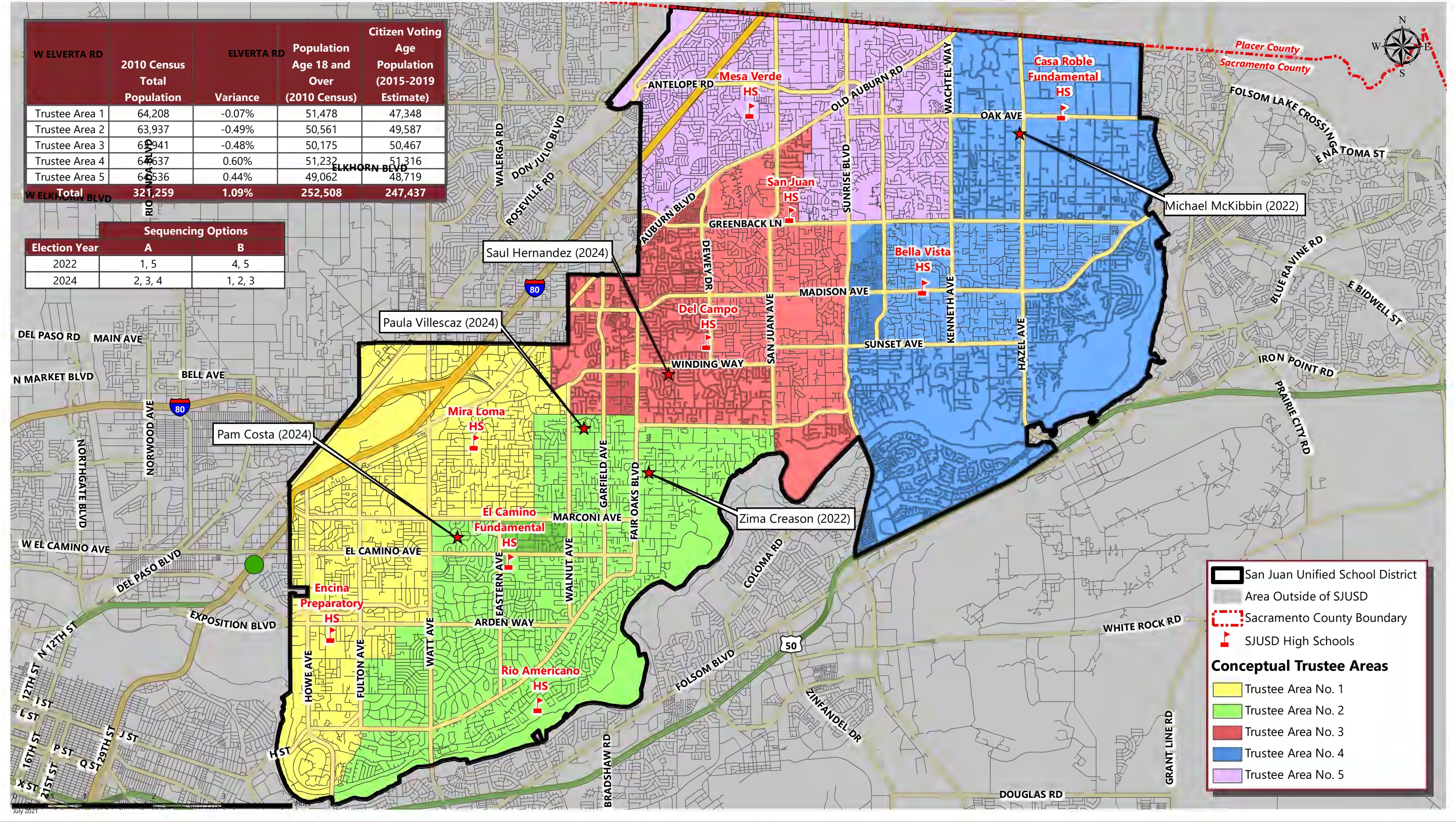

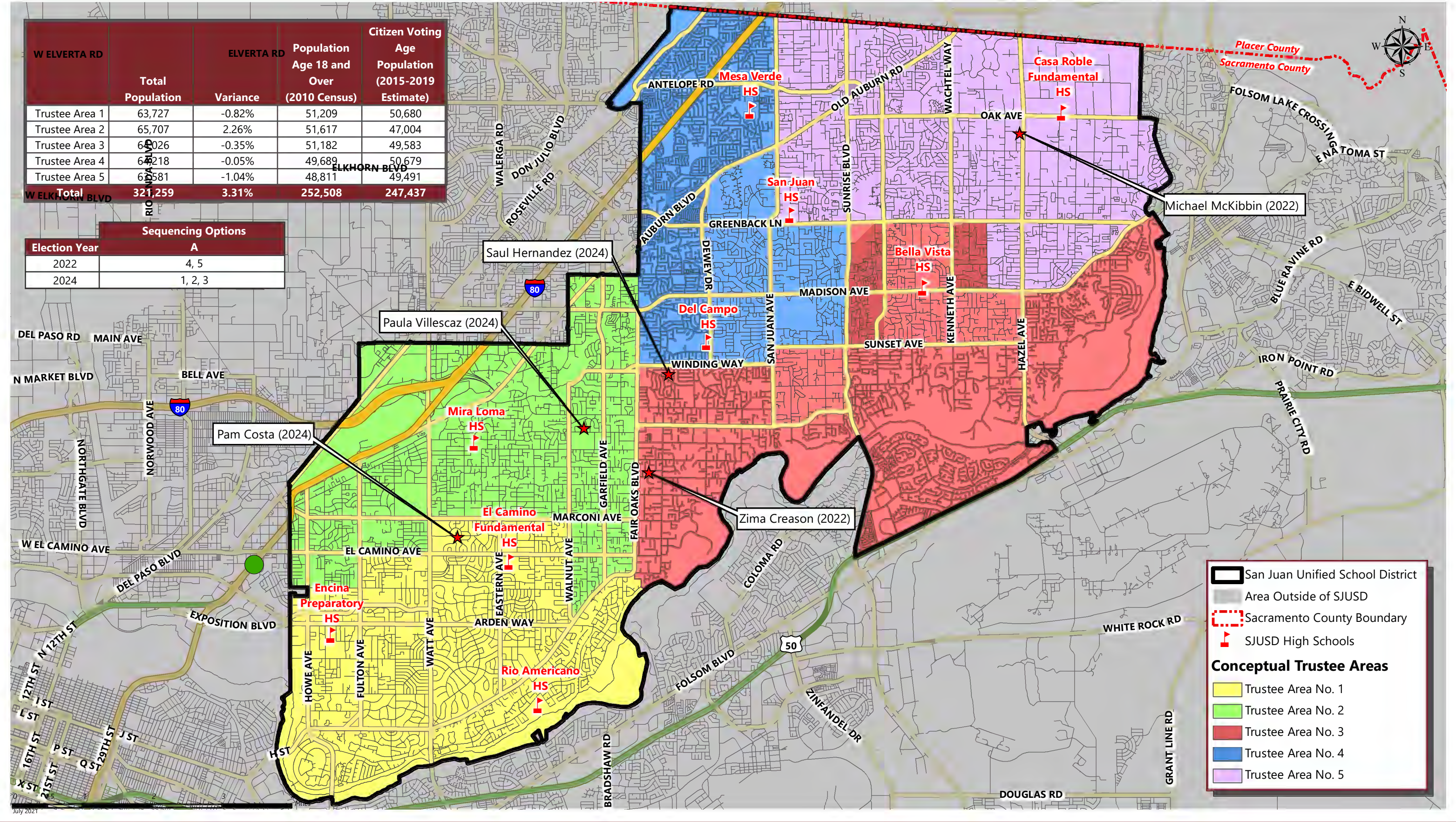

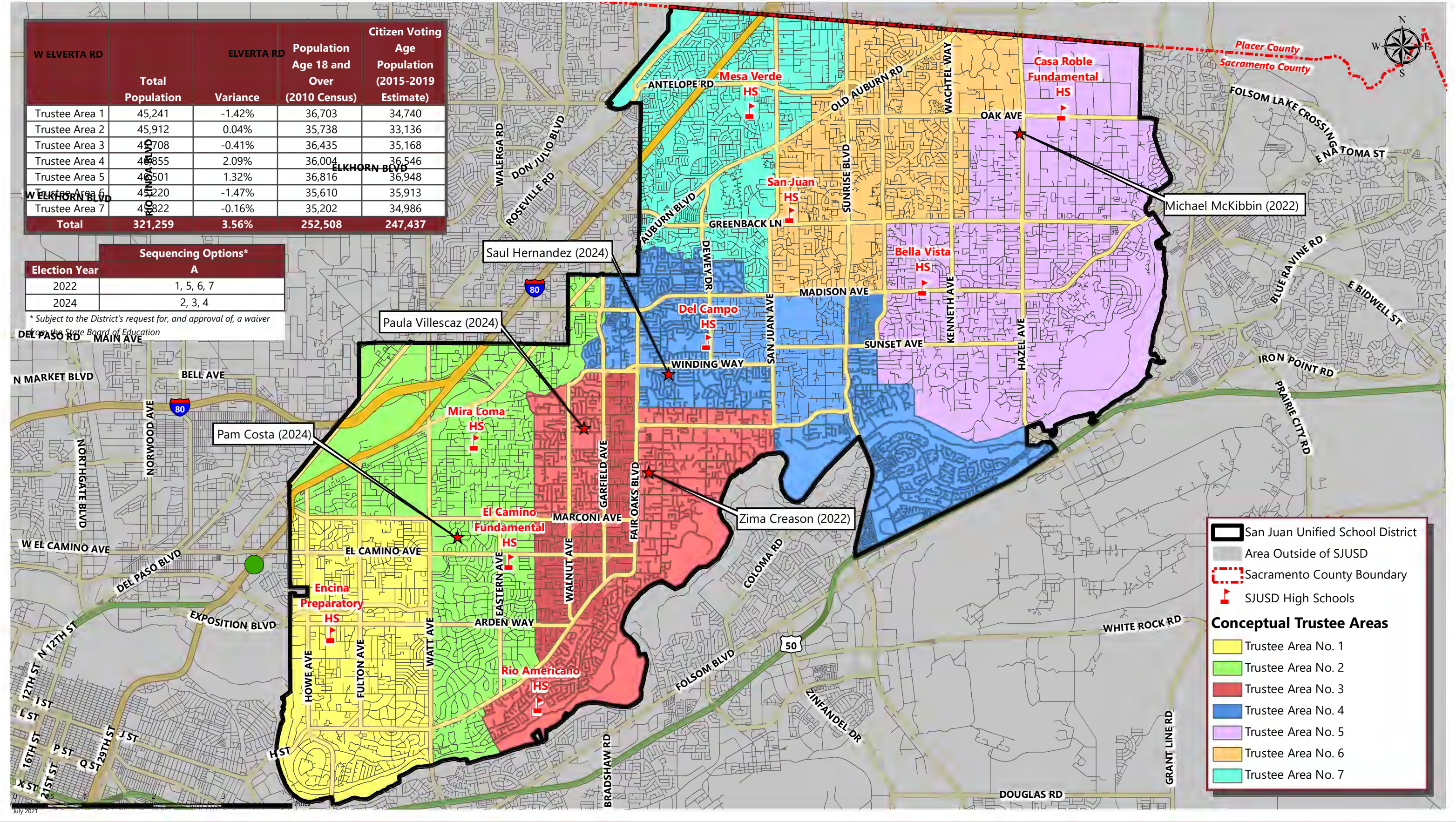

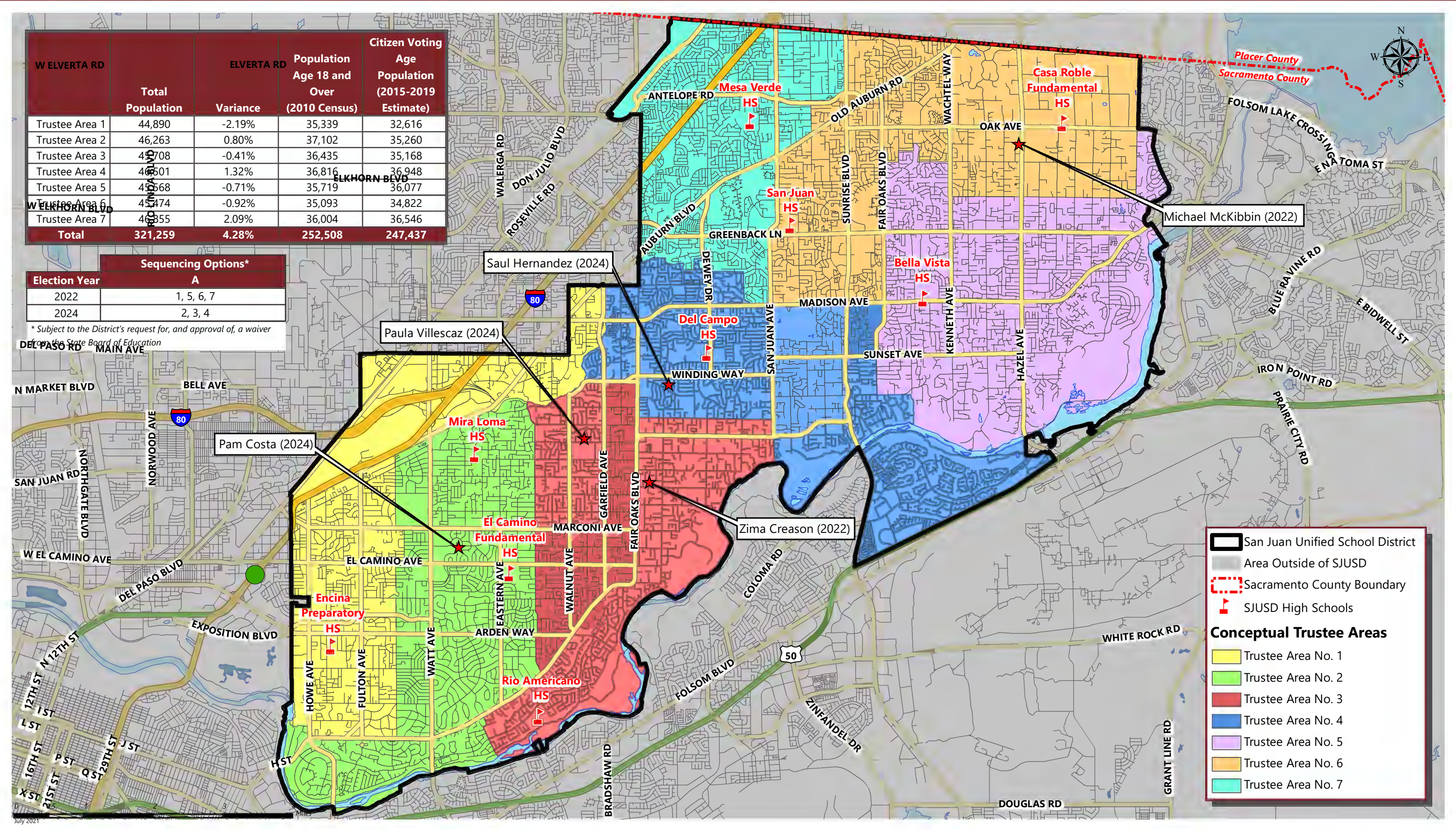

SACRAMENTO COUNTY COMMITTEE ON SCHOOL DISTRICT ORGANIZATION

RESOLUTION NO. CC-21-01

Resolution Approving San Juan Unified School District Proposal Pursuant to Education Code Section 5019

WHEREAS, the governing board of the San Juan Unified School District (SJUSD) is composed of five members, who are elected by the registered voters of the entire school district (“at-large elections”);

WHEREAS, Education Code section 5019 authorizes a school district governing board, by resolution, to initiate a proposal to increase the number of governing board members from five to seven and to change its method of electing governing board members;

WHEREAS, Education Code section 5030 authorizes alternative methods of electing school district governing board members, including at-large, hybrid, and by trustee area elections;

WHEREAS, on July 28, 2021, SJUSD submitted a proposal to the Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization (County Committee) under Education Code section 5019 to, effective for the November 8, 2022 election, increase the number of SJUSD governing board members from five to seven, change its election method so one board member residing in each trustee area will be elected by the registered voters who reside in that trustee area (by “trustee area elections”), and establish the sequence of elections.

WHEREAS, SJUSD’s proposal and public website and other publicly available information indicate that public hearings, outreach, and other events related to SJUSD’s proposed change of election method, trustee area boundary maps, number of governing board members, and/or sequence of elections have been conducted as follows:

- March 10, 2020 – SJUSD held public hearing and adopted (1) Resolution No. 2982 declaring its intention to transition to “by-trustee area” elections, and (2) Resolution No. 2983 to seek a waiver from the State Board of Education of the Education Code requirements that proposed election method changes be submitted to school district voters for approval or denial.
- March 31, 2020 – Demographer presented to SJUSD on the process for changing to “by-trustee area” elections. SJUSD held a public hearing to obtain public input regarding the composition of trustee areas for board member elections before preparing draft boundary maps.
- April 9, 2020 – To protect public health and safety during the period when public health officials found it necessary to physical distance to prevent the spread of COVID-19, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-48-20 allowing political subdivisions, including school districts, to pause or “toll” the Elections Code 10010 timelines for changing to trustee area elections.

- April 14, 2020 – SJUSD pulled from its board meeting agenda a planned presentation and public hearing on the district’s election transition process to evaluate Governor Newsom’s Executive Orders and their effect on the district’s process.
- April 28, 2020 – SJUSD adopted Resolution No. 2991 to temporarily postpone hearings related to the board’s transition to by-trustee area elections until such time as neither state nor local public health officials recommend or impose COVID-19 social distancing measures.
- May 7, 2020 – State Board of Education approved SJUSD’s request to waive Education Code requirement that proposed election method changes be submitted to school district voters for approval or denial.
- June 8, 2021 – SJUSD reviewed the timeline and steps necessary to restart the transition process as COVID-19 pandemic conditions improve and health restrictions are expected to be eased.
- June 11, 2021 – Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-08-21, lifting the “tolling” of statutory timelines for changing to by trustee area elections, effective after June 30, 2021.
- June 22, 2021 – SJUSD reviewed the revised timeline and steps to restart the transition process based on Governor Newsom’s Executive Order N-08-21.
- June 30, 2021 - Governor Newsom’s Executive Order tolling the statutory timelines expired.
- July 1, 2021 – SJUSD heard demographer presentation, held a public hearing to obtain public input on the trustee-area map creation process, and adopted Resolution No. 3059 identifying the criteria for developing trustee-area boundaries.
- July 6, 2021 – SJUSD published eight proposed trustee area maps (four maps for the five trustee areas scenarios and four maps for the seven trustee areas scenarios), along with potential election sequencing schedules.
- July 13, 2021 – SJUSD heard demographer presentation and held public hearing to consider public input regarding proposed maps and whether SJUSD board should expand from five to seven members.
- July 14-15, 2021 – SJUSD held community meetings at six locations throughout the district and twice online via Zoom to allow community members to review the eight proposed maps and provide additional feedback. The community meetings were advertised throughout the district via flyers, emails, and telephone calls, and on the SJUSD website, where the information was provided in English, Spanish, Arabic, Farsi-Dari, Russian, and Ukrainian. Community members provided feedback in person, via the Zoom online meetings, and via Jamboards. Community input was posted on SJUSD’s website.

- July 20, 2021 – In response to community input about Citrus Heights and the North Highlands portion of Arden-Arcade, SJUSD’s demographer developed and published a ninth map and additional election sequencing schedules.
- July 27, 2021 – SJUSD held a public hearing to gather additional community input and adopted Resolution No. 3065 setting forth its proposal under Education Code section 5019, et seq.
- In addition to SJUSD’s community outreach throughout the district, notices of SJUSD’s public hearings and process were posted on the SJUSD website (with content available in Spanish, Farsi, Arabic, Ukrainian, Pashto, and Russian) and published in the Sacramento Bee in English and Spanish.

WHEREAS, on August 5, 2021, as required by Education Code section 5019, and after having complied with all notice requirements, the Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization (County Committee) conducted a public hearing on SJUSD’s proposal, which was accessible to members of the public in person and via Zoom video and/or audio teleconference;

WHEREAS, notice of the County Committee’s public hearing was posted on the SJUSD and Sacramento County Office of Education websites.

WHEREAS, SJUSD has submitted information in support of its proposal to increase the number of governing board members from five to seven, change its election method to “by trustee area” elections, and establish the sequence of elections, the record reflects rational reasons for SJUSD’s proposal, and SJUSD’s proposal appears to be consistent with the law.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that:

1. The recitals set forth above are correct and true.
2. The Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization hereby approves SJUSD’s proposal to:
 - a. Change to “by trustee area” elections, implementing the SJUSD trustee area boundaries identified in the “Seven Trustee Areas-Conceptional Map No. 3.”
 - b. Increase the number of SJUSD governing board members from five to seven, to be implemented in accordance with the State Board of Education’s decision on SJUSD’s waiver request.
 - c. Sequence SJUSD elections as follows:
 - i. Schedule Trustee Areas 3 and 5 for election in 2022;
 - ii. Schedule Trustee Areas 2 and 4 for election in 2024;
 - iii. Establish the election schedule for the three uninhabited Trustee Areas 1, 6, and 7 as determined by the County Committee at its August 5, 2021 public meeting “by lot,” and in accordance with Education Code section 5021(a), as follows:

- Trustee Areas ____ and ____ shall be scheduled for election in 2022, and at subsequent four-year intervals thereafter;
 - Trustee Area ____ shall be scheduled for election in 2024, and at subsequent four-year intervals thereafter.
3. SJUSD shall submit the Board member increase, change in method of electing governing board members, trustee areas boundary map, sequence of elections, and any other required information to the appropriate county elections officials, and to all other necessary parties by all required deadlines.
 4. The Sacramento County Committee on School District Organization hereby authorizes the Sacramento County Superintendent of Schools or designee to take any other actions needed to effectuate the purposes of this resolution.
